#### Special Offerings Connect Us to the Ministries of the Entire United Church of Christ STRENGTHEN THE CHURCH

The Strengthen the Church (STC) offering reflects the shared commitment of people across the United Church of Christ to cooperatively build up the UCC. Conferences and national setting equally share the gifts given by members and friends through their local congregations. The funds raised support leadership development, new churches, youth ministry, and innovation in existing congregations. By our generosity to this offering, we build up the Body of Christ.

Kerry Kirtley and the Rev. Billie Watts found their way to the UCC from a church that wouldn't offer the wide openness they sought. Boerne (pronounced "bernie"), population 17,000, is a half-hour northwest of San Antonio, and while it "would not be known for its diversity," Kirtley said, it is not a place where hate rallies would take place, either. When it comes to LGBTQ folks, its 50-plus churches "will pray for and welcome people on the margins to some extent, but are pretty conditional in doing so," Kirtley said. She was a deacon and Watts was a minister in a Methodist church there.

Kirtley and Watts both had raised gay sons years ago. In recent years they began to advocate openness and affirmation in church and community. They organized Boerne's first Pride Walk, which drew an unexpected 250 people. They encountered some resistance in their congregation, and

when the General Conference of the United Methodist Church voted in 2019 to tighten its denomination-wide ban on same-sex marriage and gay and lesbian clergy, "it was over," Kirtley said.

When some 75 people showed up for a celebratory worship service after the Pride Walk, Kirtley and Watts became convinced the town could use a UCC of its own.

After conferring with the South Central Conference, "we opened as a UCC Church in Formation and grew into a UCC congregation, Touchstone UCC," Kirtley said. As a member in discernment working toward UCC ordination, she co-pastors the church with Watts, who transferred her ministerial standing to the UCC.

A \$40,000 Strengthen the Church grant, which Touchstone matched by raising another \$40,000, allows the congregation to, among other things, rent the community room of a senior center.

#### **CHRISTMAS FUND**

The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks each December to our lower-income retirees.

Vernis Brown is the widow of the Rev. Roy Brown, who was called to be a pastor at age 7 and served UCC congregations until he suffered a stroke in 1997 and passed away in 2002. Vernis said her husband always kept his promise to God to serve small congregations, which meant that she and Roy were often the only staff in churches they served in Minnesota, Wisconsin, and South Dakota. Vernis taught Sunday school, ran vacation Bible school, and worked with the women's and youth groups.

In addition to preaching, Roy also drove a school bus, and worked as a farmer, hunter, trapper and fisherman. While she would never trade her life as a preacher's wife for anything, Vernis recalls how she, Roy and their 10 children lived on very little because the small churches they served couldn't afford to pay much.

But the annual Christmas thank-you check has been and continues to be a welcomed contribution to her family. Each year, Vernis donates one-tenth of her check back to the Christmas Fund and encourages others to give as well.

"It has really been a blessing and helped us in so many ways," Vernis said of the fund. "I'm the first one to stand up and say, 'I'm a recipient. Give generously to help other people.'"

- \* update by-laws to insure officers are legally protected
- \* if we need to close in the future, property, funds are turned over to PSEC
- \* bring in a vocal soloist once or twice a month-alternate with a choir if one starts again
- \* counseling for what's left of the church congregation
- \* events/programs to build a sense of community within the congregation (social, group fundraising, etc)
