Upcoming Worship Services

On World Wide Communion Sunday, October 1, the Rev. Susan Scott will preach at Carversville UCC. She is a self-employed spiritual director, ordained in the UCC. A Doylestown resident, she is a chaplain and has ministered in a variety of geriatric and hospice settings. In 2019 her collection of meditations for older adults was published by the Upper Room. Please join us for this special communion service. On October 8, L. Robert Kling will be conducting our worship service. As a long time member of our congregation, he needs no introduction. The following Sunday, October 15, another member of our congregation, Barbara Gunn, will lead worship.

Beginning October 22, the Rev. Dr. Chuck Maxfield will be leading Sunday worship services. He was raised in the Congregational Church in Massachusetts, the forerunner of the UCC. Chuck was ordained in the UCC and has served churches in a variety of settings as well as in PA. At this time it is planned for him to serve at least through the end of the year. The agreement is that he will lead worship each Sunday. He will not be available for meetings, Bible study, funerals or weddings. Rev. Maxfield will not have office hours.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

Through One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) we engage in holistic development programs including health care, education, agriculture, food sustainability, micro-financing and women's empowerment. We help meet immediate needs and we address the underlying causes that create those needs in the first place.

From Pennsylvania to Palestine and many locations around the world, the United Church of Christ is working with partners and communities to respond to the more than 25 million global refugees.

Gifts from congregations support disaster relief, refugee assistance and sustainable development, both domestically and around the globe.

But it's not just about the money. Congregations that financially support these vital ministries find that their giving is more than simply dollars. Instead, it's a spiritual practice that connects them to the wider world.

The Rev. Eric Fistler, senior pastor of First Congregational Church (FCC) of Crystal Lake, Ill., has been an eyewitness to this work.

"OGHS takes us beyond the headlines, and deeper than thoughts and prayers," he said, "to hear transforming stories about the empowerment of women in Ghana, the peacemaking accompaniment in Palestine, stigma-reducing education about HIV in Lesotho and connecting with refugees from all over the world."

To give is to receive is perhaps the most important point for Fistler. "OGHS is not only about transforming the world, but about being transformed ourselves, for we truly cannot live the abundant life, until every person has what they need to live the abundant life," he said. OGHS has also supported twelve churches from eight different faith traditions that are welcoming refugees from Afghanistan to Albuquerque, N.M. Through what they call the ABQ FaithWorks Collaborative, they have been aiding refugees and other homeless people since 2019.

"I highly recommend collaborating," said the Rev. Sue Joiner, pastor of First Congregational United Church of Christ Albuquerque. "That's how FaithWorks began. We asked, 'Why are we doing this by ourselves?' We can do so much better work together — pooling financial resources and people."

NEIGHBORS IN NEED

Neighbors in Need (NIN) supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants.

A grant from the Neighbors in Need offering helped 24 high school students from an economically challenged Houston neighborhood learn about activism and carry out a local campaign for a \$15 minimum-wage law.

The idea came from the basic insight that many Houston residents find it hard to make ends meet, especially workers in fast-food and other service industries. The Rev. Darnell Fennell serves some of those people in both his callings. He is pastor of Just Love Church, affiliated with the UCC and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). He also teaches high school social studies.

With a background in community organizing, Fennell knows people don't have to sit still for economic injustice. He knows the wider UCC feels the same. So he sought the NIN grant to introduce young people to local activists in the national Fight for \$15.00 wage campaign and involved them in learning by doing.

STUFFING STOCKINGS!!!!

Once again Carversville UCC has partnered with Americans for Native Americans (ANA) to provide "first ever" Christmas stockings and fleece blankets to Native American students at a school(s) serviced by ANA in New Mexico. Rather than "adopting" one large school as in previous years, this year we will "adopt" two smaller schools, Lake Valley and Sanostee Day School. Currently both schools are in session with only 43 total students enrolled, but that number is expected to increase over the next month. Per ANA Board President Mary Lee Reiff, due to the impact of the Covid pandemic in the Southwest, students are just gradually returning to school. No matter the number, this outreach gives us an opportunity to bring joy to kids who will be getting their "first ever" Christmas stocking!!!

As of this writing, enough crayons, Matchbox cars, tooth brushes, etc. have been donated to fill 100 stockings. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation and community members, every student at our "adopted" schools will receive a "first ever" stocking. Extra stockings will bring joy to children who live at Bethany Children's Home in Womelsdorf, PA.

We will be stuffing the stockings on Sunday, October 29th, following the worship service. SANTA NEEDS YOUR HELP!!!! Please mark your calendars to join the fun!
